



Care and Sizing

In this section of our website we will give you the necessary advice for choosing the right size in jewellery, and the needed care advice to enable you to look after it and continue to use it and enjoy your jewellery forever.

Ring Sizing

Knowing the size of our rings is very simple, follow our instructions and you will see just how simple it is:

Using our ring sizes.

The following chart shows the most common equivalences between the spanish ring sizes and the ring diameter's measurement in millimetres and inches.

| Ring Sizing Chart | | |
|-------------------|----------------------------|-----------------------|
| Size (Spain) | Diameter in millimetres | Diameter in inches |
| 10 | 15,92 mm | 0,62 " |
| 12 | 16,55 mm | 0,65" |
| 14 | 17,19 mm | 0,67 " |
| 16 | 17,83 mm | 0,7 " |
| 18 | 18,46 mm | 0,72 " |
| 20 | 19,1 mm | 0,74 " |

Have in mind that if the chosen ring is wide, the needed measurement may be larger than if the ring is very narrow. .


How to measure ring sizes?

Use a ring that fits you comfortably and that is of the same thickness more or less as the one that you wish to acquire. (Fig. 1)

We will place the ring over a ruler or measuring tape and make note of the diameter's measurement of the widest part of the ring, right in the centre. (Fig. 2)

In this case it would be 17.2 mm or 0.67 inches which is the equivalent of a size 14.





Necklace Sizing

Jewellery Care

Storage advice

Treat your jewellery with care and keep it in a little airtight bag that will allow you to protect it from rusting, never keep it in humid places.

Use a humid cotton cloth to clean them

Stones

Stones shouldn't be washed with detergents, scented soaps or anything similar as seen as their residues may dull the stones.

Noble metals

Mercury affects any noble metal permanently, by which means any contact should be avoided.

Avoid contact with fresh water and sea water

Do not wear your pieces of jewellery when doing exercise, or when you swim in seas or in swimming pools. The excess of sweat may alter them.

VERY IMPORTANT:

The zircons lose their shine from contact with alcohol, perfumes and colognes; NEVER expose them to these products as their shine could disappear forever.
